### **OZ Forum**

### **Australia Day Community Grants programme**


Each year Australia Day Council NT invites councils and not-for-profits to apply for up to \$3000 to hold activities or events within two weeks of Australia Day.

### Australia Day Council regional conference

**Each October**, Australia Day Council NT holds a conference for our regional network.

The conference is a great opportunity for those working in events and sport and recreation roles to brainstorm and network with those from other NT councils in similar roles. It also gives those working in the more remote locations an opportunity for professional development that they may not easily have access to.

The agenda covers topics that are relevant to event organizers with a strong focus on Australia Day activities and presenters are usually local business people who generously give their time.

Australia Day Council NT covers the cost of travel and accommodation for one delegate from each council as well as hosting a pre-conference dinner to allow delegates to meet each other beforehand.

This year's conference was held at the Adina Vibe Hotel in Darwin and the delegates were treated to dinner at the Waterfront the night before.

### **OZ RUN**

One of the highlights of Darwin's Australia Day events is OZ RUN, formerly known as the Australia Day Fun Run.



OZ RUN is held on the morning of Australia Day 26 January at the Darwin Waterfront, OZ RUN is the Territory's largest running event attracting over 4,000 people who participate in a 3km or 5km fun run/walk.

In 2021 Australia Day Council NT was fortunate to receive a grant for \$20,000 through the National Australia Day Council Australia Day grants programme to ensure that OZ Run was still able to go ahead in a COVID safe manner.

Approximately 2500 participants attended.

### Tour of Honour 2021 Young Australian of the Year – Isobel Marshall (and business partner Eloise Hall)

The Tour of Honour began in Alice Springs where we attended a morning tea hosted by the Ngaanyatjarra Pitjantjatjara Yankunytjatjara (NPY) Women's Council and then a lunchtime networking event with Isobel as the Keynote speaker before travelling to Darwin.

The week was spent meeting with school students and community groups in Nhulunbuy, Yirrkala and across the Top End. One of the highlights was catching up with NT Australian of the Year Dr Wendy Page and her team at Miwatj Aboriginal Corporation in Nhulunbuy. Visiting with Miwatj was a very educational experience for Isobel and Eloise and they heard firsthand from the Yolngu women about what menstruation signifies in their culture and how young girls interact with certain family members, the protocols they must adhere to and how they feel about their bodies during this time.

We left Nhulunbuy to travel back to Darwin where Isobel and Eloise were hosted for afternoon tea by Youthwork NT. Youthworx NT is a not-for-profit organization that works in partnership with education, business, government and the community to improve the career potential of all Territorians.

There were a few young women who had already heard of TABOO. They have been following Isobel and Eloise's journey over the past couple of years and were excited to meet the Young Australian of the Year.

Isobel and Eloise left a great impression on every group that they met and inspired a lot of young Territorians by showing that if you have an idea, passion, self-belief and your best mate then anything is possible!



### **OZ Sports**

Each year community sporting groups and clubs are encouraged to hold a competition or event on Australia Day, 26 January to contribute to Australia Day celebrations throughout the Northern Territory.

The OZ Sports program is free to participate in and offers clubs and organisations an opportunity to promote their programs and encourage new memberships.

The four recipients then go on to represent the NT in Canberra for the National Announcement on Australia Day eve and this year, Dr Miriam Rose Ungunmerrour senior was announced a national recipient.

### Citizen of the Year Awards

The Australia Day Citizen of the Year Awards are proudly presented by the Australia Day Council Northern Territory, supported by the Northern Territory Government.

Citizen of the Year Awards reward and recognise individuals and organisations that have made a noteworthy contribution during the current year, and/or given outstanding service over several years, to a local community over and above normal employment duties.

Outstanding contribution and community service include areas such as education, health, fundraising, charitable and voluntary services, business, sport, arts, the environment, or any other area that contributes to the advancement and wellbeing of a community.

### **Student Citizen Awards**

The Australia Day Student Citizen Award recognises students who shows a sense of fair play, generosity of spirit, concern for others, cultural understanding and a positive attitude and involvement within their school and/or wider community.

Every school in the Northern Territory is invited to participate in the program by selecting one student per primary, middle and senior secondary school to receive the Student Citizen Award for their school.

Award recipients receive a specially minted engraved medallion along with a certificate signed by the Administrator, Chief Minister, and Chair of the Australia Day Council.

We encourage presentation of the award to take place at the student's community's flag raising ceremony on Australia Day but understand this is not always possible.

Many schools select to present the award at their end of year assembly before school breaks for Christmas.

All award recipients are acknowledged in a full-page coloured advertisement in the NT News on Australia Day.

- 151 students received Student Citizen Awards across the Northern Territory in 2021.
- 107 schools presented the Student Citizen Award at their end of the school presentation while 44 students received their award on Australia Day at their local community flag raising ceremony.
- 65 urban, 15 rural and 59 remote primary schools participated in the program.
- 16 urban and 14 remote middle schools participated in the program.
- 17 urban, 7 rural and 8 remote senior/high schools participated in the program.

### **Ambassador Program**

The Australia Day Ambassador Program is the cornerstone of local Australia Day celebrations. Each year over Ambassadors generously volunteer their time and energy to visit regional and remote areas across the Northern Territory to inspire and unite communities.

### Governance

Nigel Browne (Chair)

Nigel is a descendant of the Larrakia and Wulna peoples. His traditional Country encompasses the lands and waters of the Greater Darwin Region including Darwin & Bynoe harbours, Cox Peninsula, Vernon Islands, Adelaide & Mary Rivers, Acacia, Cape Hotham, Fogg Dam, Humpty Doo & Koolpinyah Stations and Djukbinj National Park.

He is the current CEO of the LDC after serving as a Director on the board since 2005 and Chair from 2010 to 2013. In August 2011 Nigel was announced as the National

Indigenous Legal Professional of the Year, in recognition of his advocacy, representation, and contribution to Larrakia people. He is also a member of the Australian Institute of Company Directors.

### Katherine Li

Katherine Li is proud to call Australia home after migrating from China around ten years ago. As a fluent and confident communicator in Mandarin and English, Katherine prides herself on building strong relationships with those she meets.

As a passionate advocate for multicultural societies, Australia has helped Katherine's passion for supporting others to grow. In 2018/19, Katherine was the President of the Young Professionals Network NT supporting hundreds of young Territorians to get involved with social and professional development events.

### **David Taylor**

David was named 2016 Australian of the Year NT Local Hero in recognition for his work with disengaged, home-

less, and at-risk young people. Using his background as a teaching Chef, he used his culinary knowledge and his passion to effect real change to guide them back into education or into meaningful employment.

David facilitates personal growth and wellness sessions in Darwin schools for the GROW Foundation. He believes that until young people can see themselves as useful and worthwhile, they will struggle to have a positive outlook for the future. It is up to each of us to encourage our young people with love, care, and compassion.

Nathan is a mechanical engineer with experience in oil and gas, mining, public policy and local government sectors.

Currently a Principal Project Officer for the NT Government, Nathan is passionate about supporting industry sectors to grow their capabilities.
