Events

OZ Run & Australia Day

This year we held the largest Australia Day event in history in the Northern Territory.. Our focus was to present an event that encompassed the theme of Reflect. Respect. Celebrate. as well as showcase the diversity and unique beauty of Darwin and the Northern Territory.

One of the highlights of Darwin's Australia Day events is OZ RUN, (formerly known as the Australia Day Fun Run).

OZ RUN is held on the morning of Australia Day 26 January at the Darwin Waterfront, Participants can choose to run, walk, or jog around a 3km or 5km course.

Our annual OZ Run event went ahead with over 1000 participants despite COVID restrictions.



The day continued with morning activities including a Smoking Ceremony, Citizenship ceremony and multi-cultural fashion show.

All activities focused on what unites us as Territorians, including food, dance, cultural performances, live street art painting, kids and family activities.

The day finished with three world-class performance artists and bespoke projections that highlighted our beautiful NT landscapes.

The Australia Day event attracted almost 3,000 people throughout the day.

More than 50 local business were involved directly and more than 60 casual jobs were created.

17 Darwin local business and not-for-profit organisations were involved and 10 multicultural groups performed. These included those with cultural connections to Italy, Colombia, Zimbabwe, Nepal, Thailand, PNG and Indonesia.

OZ Sports

Each year community sporting groups and clubs are encouraged to hold a competition or event on Australia Day, 26 January to contribute to Australia Day celebrations throughout the Northern Territory.

The OZ Sports program is free to participate in and offers clubs and organisations an opportunity to promote their programs and encourage new memberships.

This year we received 33 event registrations from across the Territory.

Annual Conference

Every October, Australia Day Council NT holds a conference for our regional network. The conference is a great opportunity for those working in events and sport and recreation roles to brainstorm and network with those from other NT councils in similar roles.

It also gives those working in the more remote locations an opportunity for

professional development that they may not easily have access to.

The topics covered are relevant to event organisers with a strong focus on Australia Day activities and presenters are usually local business persons.

We also invite the current NT Australian of the Year to inspire delegates and share their story. Australia Day Council NT covers the cost of travel and accommodation for one delegate from each council. Delegates were treated to dinner at the Waterfront the night before, allowing everybody to network and meet beforehand in a relaxed atmosphere. Each year the location of the conference alternates, one year in Darwin and the next in regional NT. This year's conference was held at the Adina Vibe Hotel in Darwin.

One of the highlights this year was the "Speed Networking" session where delegates had one minute each to talk about what happens in their council/community on Australia Day. This was a great way to share ideas within a short time period.

Alumni Activity

A Night Under The Stars

Over 110 people attended "A Night Under The Stars with Leanne Liddle" who delivered a powerful and thought provoking speech, sharing her personal journey of experiencing racism. Other alumni were involved including 2022 NT Australia's Local Hero NT recipient, Rebecca Forrest who organised the event and 2019 NT Senior Australian of the Year, Charlie King who was the MC. This event also coincided with National Reconciliation Week.



Tour of Honour 2022 with Kate Everett, Bernie Shakeshaft, and Leanne Liddle

Part one of the Tour of Honour began in Nhulunbuy, East Arnhemland where 2019 Australia's Local Hero, Kate Everett (Dolly's Dream) and 2020 Australia's Local Hero, Bernie Shakeshaft (Backtrack Youthworks) spoke with the students at the local primary and high schools about the importance of being kind and open about emotions. They also had an interview with Gove FM before travelling to Darwin for a meet and greet with Australia Day Council NT board and alumni.

Part two of the Tour of Honour saw Bernie travel to Alice Springs with 2022 NT Australian of the year, Leanne Liddle. The time there was spent with two early morning radio interviews with CAAMA Radio and ABC Alice Springs Radio. CAAMA Radio has over 60,000 listeners nation wide and produce 99% of their own content to share with other aboriginal radio stations across Australia.

Bernie and Leanne spoke at the "Lunch with Legends" event held at Saltbush Restaurant. 42 people attended and the Alice Springs Town Council Deputy Mayor, Eli Melky MC'd the event.

The final activity for the Tour of Honour was a visit to the Gap Youth Centre with 2019 NT Australian of the Year nominee Adam Drake. The Gap's organizational goal is to provide a safe place for indigenous youth and their families.

OZ FORUM

(Budgeted for June but held in August.)

Each year Australia Day Council NT hold an OZ Forum event where we invite Australian of the Year Awards alumni and friends of Australia Day Council to participate in a panel discussion.

The discussion topic is a subject that ties all panelists together.

Over 30 attendees came along to the this year's OZ Forum at the NT Library to hear our panel explore the topic "Volunteering: Benefit or Burden?".

Our amazing panel, Malia Ford, Robyne Burridge OAM, Valmai Dempsey, and Yvette Amos equated to 127 years of volunteering experience.

Our panel enlightened us about the benefits and challenges of volunteering, shared their amazing and personal stories, and inspired us to volunteer ourselves. It was a feel good, positive night with attendees ranging in age from young adults to seniors.

Student Citizen of the Year

The Australia Day Student Citizen Award recognises students who show a sense of fair play, generosity of spirit, concern for others, cultural understanding and a positive attitude and involvement within their school and/or wider community.


Every school in the Northern Territory is invited to participate in the program by selecting one student per primary, middle and senior school to receive the Student Citizen Award for their school.

Award recipients receive a specially minted engraved medallion along with a certificate signed by the Administrator, Chief Minister, and Chair of the Australia Day Council.

We encourage presentation of the award to take place at the student's community's flag raising ceremony on Australia Day but understand this is not always possible.

Many schools choose to present the award at their end of year assembly before school breaks for Christmas. All award recipients are acknowledged in a full page coloured advertisement in the NT News on Australia Day.

Citizen of the Year

The Australia Day Citizen of the Year Awards are proudly presented by the Australia Day Council Northern Territory, supported by the Northern Territory Government.

Citizen of the Year Awards reward and recognise individuals and organisations that have made a noteworthy contribution

during the current year, and/or given outstanding service over several years, to a local community over and above normal employment duties.

Outstanding contribution and community service include areas such as education, health, fundraising, charitable and voluntary services, business, sport, arts, the environment, or any other area that contributes to the advancement and wellbeing of a community.

Each year Australia Day Council NT invites councils and not-for-profits to apply for up to \$3000 to hold activities or events within two weeks of Australia Day.


These events can be anything from a flag raising and awards ceremony to cane toad racing, lamington eating or a throwing competition.

Governance

Dr Richard Fejo (Chair)

Richard is a Larrakia man from Darwin from his father, his grandfather and his great grandfather in what culture calls "Grandfather lore". He is also Warumungu from Tennant Creek on his mother's side and holds a great amount of cultural knowledge and experiences from both northern and central Australian across the Northern Territory.

Richie started working as a Cultural Educator with Northern Territory General Practice Education for eleven years resigning from cultural education in 2020 to become the Flinders University Elder on Campus in Darwin. From 2018 Richie became the Chairman of the Larrakia Nation Aboriginal Corporation (LNAC) until November 2021. In November 2020 Richie became the Chairman of the Darwin Waterfront Corporation and also has had previous roles with City of Darwin International Relations Committee from 2020 to 2022 standing down to become the current chairman of the Australia Day Council.

Nigel Browne (Chair) - Resigned 23 February 2022

Nigel is a descendant of the Larrakia and Wulna peoples. In August 2011 Nigel was announced as the National Indigenous Legal Professional of the Year, in recognition of his advocacy, representation, and contribution to Larrakia people.

Helen Summers

For more than 25 years, optometrist Helen Summers has been devoted to caring for the vision of Top End communities, and helping to prevent blindness through education and employment. Helen also lectures and volunteers in not-for-profit and charities for people with vision loss and learning and neuro-developmental delays.

Helen is an advocate for the goals of Vision 2020 and Close the Gap for Vision – to reduce preventable blindness and provide vision services to regional and remote Australia. As well as active involvement in vision-related national and internal organisations, Helen has served as a non-executive director and committee member on Australian boards across health, social, indigenous and sporting sectors. Helen's passion for life has also seen her join a team to complete a 64km group trek on the Sunshine Coast, raising money for charity. She inspires many with her motivation, commitment and dynamic personality.

Dr Edwin Joseph

Edwin is passionate about serving the community and being active in public life. He has a multidisciplinary education, including a doctoral degree. His experience includes roles in higher education, project management, research, policy and more. Throughout his life, Edwin has been volunteering for community groups, not-for-profit organizations and professional associations. Currently he serves on eleven boards in the Northern Territory.

Renae McGarvie APM

Renae McGarvie APM has a passion for working and volunteering at the community level. Renae grew up in Darwin and served across the Territory as a police officer for 24 years before recently becoming Chief of People and Strategy Officer for the West Daly Regional Council. She is currently undertaking an MBA at UniSA while also being involved in a variety of organisations.

Renae has two amazing children who inspire her to be a role model for them and the community. Renae is honoured to be involved with the Australia Day Council NT, recognising people that volunteer their time and dedicate their professional careers for the future generations.
